Cell Phone Policy: Cosby High School has adopted a NO Cell Phone Policy. Students will not have access to their electronic devices during the school day. This includes cell phones, smart watches, tablets, or other electronic devices.

Bathroom/Tardy Policy: If you are not in your seat working on bellringer when the bell rings you will be counted tardy. If you have an excuse/hall pass, place it in the tardy box otherwise it is unexcused. No restroom breaks the first or last 15 minutes of class. 5 trips to the bathroom per semester. Sign out on the log sheet and take the hall pass. Sign back in when you return.

Student Requirements:

- If you are absent, you are responsible for missed work. You have five days to make up missed assignments. Students may discuss missed work with me before or after class. Students may not use instructional time for make-up work.
- Students will participate in school based enterprise (Coffee Bar, Catering, and Food Service)
- Personal hygiene for cooking: shower, clip and scrub your fingernails. No jewelry, freshly washed uniform and apron. Exceptions may be made on a case by case basis.

Communication:

It is important that I am made aware of any needs the student has that are not currently being addressed. The student should speak with me and ask for accommodations when necessary. This includes tutoring, seating arrangements, hearing or vision difficulties, or other situations.

Academic honesty:

This is demonstrated by students when the ideas and the writing of others are properly cited; students submit their own work for tests and assignments without unauthorized assistance; students do not provide unauthorized assistance to others; and students report their research or accomplishments accurately. Any student that is not following the honor code will receive a grade of zero. Any student allowing another student to copy their work will also receive a grade of zero.
